
Jack & Jill's Summer Steam up, Sykehouse, 21 August 2022

It was *supposed* to be three-wheelers one side and four-wheelers the other, but heigh-ho...








A Lomax 223 in cream, a Morgan and a Berkeley in green with a yellow Lomax 223 in yellow.

David Wood was having his 7¼"G Tich tested.





A busy group of people – Jill, Richard Bethell, Karen and Kevin Avery at the Food Stall.



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


How come so many people are looking so happy and pleased about the failure of *Wildebeeste*'s injectors? Mark Batchelor, Arthur & Judith Bellamy.
